

SECTION 19 CITY OF SAN JOSE

19.1 INTRODUCTION

This City of San Jose Annex serves as an annex to the Santa Clara County Local Hazard Mitigation Plan which is an annex to the 2010 Association of Bay Area Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, *Taming Natural Disasters*. Pursuant to the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, the City Council adopted this annex on **INSERT DATE HERE**.

This document is an update to the City's annex to the 2005 Association of Bay Area Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, *Taming Natural Disasters*, as adopted on April 10, 2007.



The City of San José is the largest city in Santa Clara County, the largest city in the Bay Area, and the third largest city in California. As such, it ranks as the tenth largest metropolitan area in the United States. The California Department of Finance estimated the population at 1,023,083 as of January 1, 2010. The City provides local police and fire services, and administers the Mineta San José International Airport.

Important landmarks in San Jose include the Children's Discovery Museum of San Jose, History Park at Kelley Park, Cathedral

Basilica of St. Joseph, Plaza de César Chávez, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Library, Mexican Heritage Plaza, Rosicrucian Egyptian Museum, Lick Observatory, Hayes Mansion, HP Pavilion at San Jose, De Anza Hotel, San Jose Improv, San Jose Municipal Stadium, Spartan Stadium, Japantown San Jose, Winchester Mystery House, Raging Waters, Circle of Palms Plaza, King and Story, San Jose City Hall, San Jose Flea Market, and The Tech Museum of Innovation.

Transportation

Rail service to and within San Jose is provided by Amtrak (the Sacramento–San-Jose Capitol Corridor and the Seattle–Los-Angeles Coast Starlight), Caltrain (commuter rail service between San Francisco and Gilroy), ACE (commuter rail service from San Jose to Stockton), and a local light-rail system connecting downtown to Mountain View, Milpitas, Campbell, and Almaden Valley, operated by the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA). Long-term plans call for BART to be expanded to Santa Clara through Milpitas and San Jose from the current terminal in Fremont. In addition, San Jose will be a major stop on the future California High Speed Rail route between Los Angeles and San Francisco. Diridon Station (formerly Cahill

Depot, 65 Cahill Street) is the meeting point of all regional commuter rail service in the area. It was built in 1935 by the Southern Pacific Railroad, and was refurbished in 1994. Once the new services are operational, Diridon Station will become the busiest transportation hub in the western United States.

VTA also operates many bus routes in San Jose and the surrounding communities, as well as offering paratransit services to local residents. Additionally, the Highway 17 Express bus line connects central San Jose with Santa Cruz.

San Jose is served by Norman Y. Mineta San Jose International Airport, two miles (3 km) northwest of downtown, and by Reid-Hillview Airport of Santa Clara County, a general aviation airport located in the eastern part of San Jose. The San Jose International airport is near the intersections of three major freeways, U.S. Route 101, Interstate 880, and State Route 87.

U.S. 101 runs south to the California Central Coast and Los Angeles, and then runs north up near the eastern shore of the San Francisco Peninsula to San Francisco. I-280 also heads to San Francisco, but goes along just to the west of the cities of the San Francisco Peninsula. I-880 heads north to Oakland, running parallel to the southeastern shore of San Francisco Bay. I-680 parallels I-880 to Fremont, but then cuts northeast to the eastern cities of the San Francisco Bay Area.

Several state highways also serve San Jose: SR 17, SR 85, SR 87 and SR 237. Additionally, San Jose contains many expressways of the Santa Clara County Expressway System, including the Almaden, Capitol, San Tomas, Montague, and Lawrence Expressways.

Several regional transportation projects have been undertaken in recent years to deal with congestion on San Jose freeways. This includes expansion of State Route 87 including more lanes near the downtown San Jose area. The interchange for I-280 connecting with I-680 and US 101, a rush-hour spot where the three freeways meet has been known to have high-density traffic similar to Los Angeles County interchanges.

Utilities

Potable water is provided by four private retail companies (San José Water Company, Great Oaks Water Company, San José Municipal Water Service, and California Water Service Company).

Garbage, wastewater treatment, and recycling services are overseen by the city of San Jose's Environmental Services Department. San Jose recycles 64% of its waste.

Wastewater treatment happens at the San Jose/Santa Clara Water Pollution Control Plant, which treats and cleans the wastewater of more than 1,500,000 people that live and work in the 300+

square mile area encompassing San Jose, Santa Clara, Milpitas, Campbell, Cupertino, Los Gatos, Saratoga, and Monte Sereno.

About ten percent of the treated wastewater is sold for irrigation ("water recycling") in San Jose, Santa Clara, and Milpitas, through local water providers San Jose Municipal Water System, City of Milpitas Municipal Services, City of Santa Clara Water & Sewer Utility, Santa Clara Valley Water District, San Jose Water Company, and Great Oaks Water Company.

PG&E provides residents natural gas and electricity service. Telephone communications are provided primarily by AT&T, and cable television is provided by Comcast. Internet services are provided by several companies, but primarily by Comcast and AT&T.

WHEREAS, the City of San José ("City") has joined with 60 local jurisdictions in the San Francisco Bay Area to participate in the development of a multi-jurisdictional hazard mitigation plan by the Association of Bay Area Governments ("ABAG"), entitled "Taming Natural Disasters," which plan has been preliminarily accepted by FEMA; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to adopt the ABAG report as its local hazard mitigation plan;



Survey Results

On November 1, 2010, the Local Planning Team released an online survey to solicit public input regarding concerns for hazard risk. The Local Planning Team also used this survey to gauge the level of public preparedness for emergencies. The survey responses received from the City of San Jose residents are summarized below:

1. 144 out of 541 survey respondents were from the City of San Jose.
2. Respondents were asked which five hazards, out of the 31 hazards the LPT identified are of most concern to their neighborhood or home. Below are responses from the City of San Jose (in order of most responses):

3. Respondents were asked if a severe hazard event occurred today, such that all services were cut off from their home and they were unable to leave or access a store for 72 hours, which items they would have readily available. Below is a summary of responses from the City of San Jose respondents:

4. Respondents were asked if they were familiar with the special needs of their neighbors in the event of a disaster situation.

- 115, or **79.9%** of respondents, answered that they **are not** familiar with the special needs of their neighbors.
- 29, or **20.1%** of respondents, answered that they **are** familiar with the special needs of their neighbors.

5. Respondents were asked if they are trained members of their Community Emergency Response Team (CERT).

- 17, or **12%** of respondents indicated that they **are part of CERT**.
- 45, or **31.7%** of respondents, indicated that they are not part of CERT, but **would like to learn more about CERT**.
- 80, or **56.3%** of respondents, indicated that they are not part of CERT and **are not interested** in being a trained CERT member.

Respondents were asked to share why they are a trained CERT member, or why they are not part of CERT. The received responses are listed below:

- I will have crisis management responsibilities for my employer
- Went to a County class
- Red Cross volunteer
- I have a general understanding on what I, my family, and neighbors will need to do in an emergency
- I would like CERT in my neighborhood. I work in Mountain View and they seem much more prepared
- Didn't know it existed
- Too much responsibility
- Trained CERT member from Indiana, not San Jose
- I would like my neighbors to learn more about CERT

6. Respondents were asked what is the most important thing local government can do to help communities be more prepared for a disaster. The following summarizes the 93 responses received:

- **Citizen/City training/education/workshops**
- **Assist citizens to cope before an event (education, supplies) and after an event (food, water, shelter)**
- **Communications system that helps notify communities of what to do if there is a disaster or reasons for power outages**
- **Practice disaster drills**
- **Emergency preparedness awareness (through mail, media, website, disaster day, etc)**
- **Community outreach**
- **Outline evacuation routes and procedures**
- **Identify hazards and their specific risk areas**
- **Help neighborhoods organize so they can prepare themselves**
- **Finish Guadalupe River project**
- **Create a plan for emergency preparedness, response, and recovery and let citizens know about it**
- **Bunkers or storage containers in neighborhoods**
- **Increase focus on public transportation infrastructure**
- **Infrastructure protection**
- **Support CERT**
- **Clean out debris from creeks and waterways to prevent flooding**
- **Back up from all systems**
- **Provide list of emergency contacts and volunteers**
- **Prevent crime and riots**
- **Provide or reduce costs of emergency preparedness kits**

7. Respondents were asked if they live in an apartment building or home with a living space above a garage or parking area.

- 108 or **75%** of respondents indicated that they **do not** live in an apartment or home with living space above a garage or parking area.
- 36, or **25%** of respondents, indicated that they **do** live in an apartment building or home with living space above a garage or parking area.

Those respondents who indicated that they do live in an apartment building or home with living space above the garage or parking area were asked to describe their level of concern for the building to collapse in a large earthquake event. 5 respondents indicated that they have “High Concern”, 12 indicated they have “Moderate Concern”, 11 indicated “Little Concern”, and 4 indicated “No Concern”.

8. Respondents who are homeowners were asked if they have adequate homeowners insurance to cover the hazards that could impact their home. Below is a summary of responses:

14. Respondents were asked if their place of work is in an area susceptible to natural hazards. Below is a list of natural hazards and responses from survey respondents:

15. Respondents were asked if their employer has a plan for disaster recovery in place.

- 106, or **79.1%** of respondents, **indicated that their employer does have a disaster recovery plan in place.**
- 9, or **6.7%** of respondents, **indicated that their employer does not have a disaster recovery plan in place.**
- 19 respondents were unsure if their employer has a disaster recovery plan in place.
- 10 respondents skipped this question.

16. Respondents were asked if their employer has a workforce communications plan to implement following a disaster so they may contact their employees.

- 92, or **69.2%** of respondents indicated that their **employer does** have a workforce communications plan.
- 12, or **9%** of respondents indicated that their **employer does not** have a workforce communications plan.
- 29, or **21.8%** of respondents indicated that they are **unsure** if their employer has a workforce communications plan.
- 11 respondents skipped this question.

17. Respondents were asked to list any studies that they are aware of being conducted within their community or the county regarding the risk to future hazard events. 12 respondents replied to this question. These answers are summarized below. 132 respondents skipped this question.

- Dam inundation
- Flood
- Liquefaction maps
- Earthquake

18. Respondents were asked what recommendations they have for Santa Clara County and the incorporated cities to improve identification, prioritization, and implementation of actions intended to reduce future damage and increase resiliency. The following recommendations were received:

- Support measures that protect our food supply from exotic agricultural pests and diseases
- Communication systems
- Education programs
- Strictly enforce building codes and building permits
- Emergency preparedness awareness
- Evaluations on homes and recommendations on how to retrofit

- Provide detailed local hazard maps for all disaster types
- Remove plant growth from streams and waterways to prevent flooding and maintain flowing water
- Have retrofit information for renters
- Encourage community to take CERT training
- Provide information on where to buy emergency survival kit
- Help reduce cost of earthquake insurance
- Retrofit older buildings in downtown area
- Identify evacuation routes, strengthen levees
- Efforts should be neighborhood specific

19. Respondents were asked to recommend any companies or local associations that should be involved in the Santa Clara County hazard mitigation planning process. The recommended organizations are listed below and were given the opportunity to review the draft plan as noted in the following section.

20. Respondents were asked if they would like to review and comment on a draft of their jurisdictions annex to the Multi-Jurisdictional Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan.

- 26, or **21.5%** of respondents **said they would** like to review and comment on the draft plan.
- 95, or **78.5%** of respondents said **they would not** like to review and comment on the plan draft.
- 23 respondents skipped this question.

Twenty-four respondents who said they would like to review and comment on the draft plan included their contact information and were given the opportunity to review the draft plan as noted in the following section.

21. Respondents were asked to provide any additional comments/suggestions/questions. The responses are summarized below:

- Provide more access to training for citizens

- If the broadband and/or electrical network is offline for more than 24 hours, I'd like to know that I can go to a fire station, library or post office for information even if it's a handwritten sign
- Make sure the City's emergency information website is Smartphone friendly
- Publish a series of newspaper articles to create awareness and to educate
- More public education on preparedness
- More outreach to school classrooms so that children can be mentally prepared
- Teacher training for what to do with students in event of emergency
- Work with non-profits to get more community input
- More mock disaster drills
- Include household pets in your consideration of Multi-Hazard Mitigation plan
- Please put all pertinent information and associated help in one website

Review Opportunities

Concurrent with the Cal EMA / FEMA review process the City of San Jose is requesting public and stakeholder review of this plan update. Details regarding this review process and comments received will be incorporated prior to adopting the updated 2011 plan.

19.3 CAPABILITY ASSESSMENT

19.3.1 Mitigation Progress

19.3.1.1 Strategy Ranking

The City of San Jose participated in ABAG's revision of the regional strategies for development of this annex. Appendix G of Taming Natural Hazards presents a summary list of mitigation strategies with regional priorities and the hazards mitigated.

The City ranked those strategies in a spreadsheet provided by ABAG using the following scale:

The countywide Local Planning Team reviewed the priorities as ranked by the participating Santa Clara County jurisdictions to determine the operational area goals and objectives. The City of San Jose's primary objective is Strive to protect the community from injury and damage resulting from natural catastrophes and other hazard conditions. New mitigation actions the City of San Jose has identified are discussed in Section 19.5.

19.3.1.2 Completed projects

Existing City natural hazard mitigation policies include the following:

1. Development should only be permitted in those areas where potential danger to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the community can be mitigated to an acceptable level.
2. Levels of "acceptable exposure to risk" established for land uses and structures based on descriptions of land use groups and risk exposure levels (see 2020 General Plan Figure 15), "Acceptable Exposure to Risk Related to Various Land Uses", and should be considered in the development review process.
3. Provision should be made to continue essential emergency public services during natural catastrophes.
4. The City should continue updating, as necessary, the San José Building Code and Fire Prevention Code to address geologic, fire and other hazards.
5. The City should promote awareness and caution among San José residents regarding possible natural hazards, including soil conditions, earthquakes, flooding, and fire hazards.
6. Disaster preparedness planning should be undertaken in cooperation with other public agencies and appropriate public-interest organizations.

Existing City soil and geologic hazard policies include the following:

1. The City should require soils and geologic review of development proposals to assess such hazards as potential seismic hazards, surface ruptures, liquefaction, landholdings, mudsliding, erosion and sedimentation in order to determine if these hazards can be adequately mitigated.
2. The City should not locate public improvements and utilities in areas with identified soils and/or geologic hazards to avoid any extraordinary maintenance and operating expenses. When the location of public improvements and utilities in such areas cannot be avoided, effective mitigation measures should be implemented.
3. In areas susceptible to erosion, appropriate control measures should be required in conjunction with proposed development.
4. In order to prevent undue erosion of creek banks, the City should seek to retain creek channels in their natural state, where appropriate.
5. The Development Review process should consider the potential for any extraordinary expenditure of public resources to provide emergency services in the event of a manmade or natural disaster.

6. Development in areas subject to soils and geologic hazards should incorporate adequate mitigation measures.
7. The City should cooperate with the Santa Clara Valley Water District's efforts to prevent the recurrence of land subsidence.
8. Development proposed within areas of potential geological hazards should not be endangered by, nor contribute to, the hazardous conditions on the site or on adjoining properties.
9. Residential development proposed on property formerly used for agricultural or heavy industrial uses should incorporate adequate mitigation/remediation for soils contamination as recommended through the Development Review process.

Existing City earthquake policies include the following:

1. The City should require that all new buildings be designed and constructed to resist stresses produced by earthquakes.
2. The City should foster the rehabilitation or elimination of structures susceptible to collapse or failure in an earthquake.
3. The City should only approve new development in areas of identified seismic hazard if such hazard can be appropriately mitigated.
4. The location of public utilities and facilities, in areas where seismic activity could produce liquefaction should only be allowed if adequate mitigation measures can be incorporated into the project.
5. The City should continue to require geotechnical studies for development proposals; such studies should determine the actual extent of seismic hazards, optimum location for structures, the advisability of special structural requirements, and the feasibility and desirability of a proposed facility in a specified location.
6. Vital public utilities as well as communication and transportation facilities should be located and constructed in a way which maximizes their potential to remain functional during and after an earthquake.
7. Land uses in close proximity to water retention levees or dams should be restricted unless such facilities have been determined to incorporate adequate seismic stability.
8. Responsible local, regional, State, and Federal agencies should be strongly encouraged to monitor and improve the seismic resistance of dams in the San José area.

In addition to the above General Plan policies regarding soils and geologic hazards, in 2010, the City of San José amended the Municipal Code to include Chapter 17.10 titled, "Geologic Hazard Regulations." This ordinance restricts the ability to issue grading and building permits within defined geologic hazard zones until the Director of Public Works has issued a Certificate of Geologic Hazard Clearance.

The City has determined that the combination of construction type, age, and shaking exposure to many City Fire Stations significant. . Eight fire stations have been completely replaced or upgraded to withstand seismic hazards through a Public Safety Bond allocation .

19.3.1.3 Current projects

The City is currently developing its General Plan for 2040. This plan will include an expansion of mitigation measures related to wildland fire, geologic, flooding and seismic hazards.

19.3.2 Staff and Organizational Capabilities

19.3.2.1 Departmental Responsibilities

The City of San Jose operates several departments with capabilities for implementing hazard mitigation strategies. These departments and their roles and responsibilities are summarized in the following table.

With a clear hazard mitigation strategy, as outlined in this Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, the City's departments are able to implement their ongoing policies and programs with consideration of the identified hazard risks. In addition, these departments become aware of priority mitigation actions and can offer resources (financial or staffing) to assist with the implementation of those actions.

19.3.2.2 Technical Capability

For a successful mitigation program, it is necessary to have a diverse breadth of staff and technical capabilities. Planners, engineers, building inspectors, emergency managers, floodplain managers, people familiar with Geographic Information Systems (GIS), and grant writers are all essential to implementing mitigation actions. The following table summarizes the staffing capabilities available within the City of San Jose.

Major sources of the 2011-2012 General Fund revenues include: Property Tax (27%); Sales Tax (19%); Utility Taxes & Franchise (18%); Transfers & Reimbursements (10%); Licenses, Permits & Fees (8%); Other (8%); Business Tax (5%); and Other Agencies (5%). A General Fund shortfall of \$115 million is projected for 2011-2012.

19.3.2.4 Policy or Program Capability

The City of San Jose has several plans and ordinances in place which provide ample opportunities for implementing the hazard mitigation strategy outlined in this plan.

19.3.2.4.1 Summary of Plans that Support Hazard Mitigation

Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)

The purpose of the EOP is to provide a legal framework for the management of emergencies and guidance for the conduct of business in the Emergency Operations Center. The EOP may be activated by the order of the following in the order shown: the City Manager, Assistant City Manager, or the Fire Chief/Police Chief/Director of Emergency Preparedness. The EOP contributes to hazard mitigation capabilities by providing important information about the potential magnitude of identified hazards that may impact the city and guidance for responding to and recovering from emergencies with clearly defined roles and responsibilities for City departmental staff as well as other community organizations. The EOP is a local planning mechanism in which to incorporate the mitigation strategies and actions developed as part of this and future hazard mitigation plan updates.

General Plan

Safety Element

Development

As land becomes scarce, there is increased pressure to develop vacant land with a higher hazard potential. Development in hazardous areas, however, can result in significant costs to the community, including major property damage as well as potential loss of life. Developing in hazardous areas can also become expensive for the City to repair and replace public utilities and facilities in hazard areas. High risks to existing structures may be lowered to an acceptable level by physical alteration, relocation, demolition, or changes in use. For new development, there should be an emphasis of the General Plan's policies to regulate construction to minimize identifiable risks. The General Plan requires detailed site-specific evaluations of properties when the following sources indicate there may be a potential hazard in that location: "Technical Report, Geological Investigation, City of San Jose's Sphere of Influence", The City of San Jose Fault Hazard Maps, and FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps of San Jose. These evaluations can help identify specific impacts of a proposed development on the land and can also help develop appropriate mitigation measures for those impacts.

All Hazards

San Jose's goal is to protect the community from injury and damage resulting from natural catastrophes and other hazard conditions. In order to achieve this goal, several policies are in place and recorded in the General Plan. The General Plan states that development should only be permitted in areas where potential danger to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the community can be mitigated to an acceptable level. In the event of a fire, geologic, or other hazardous occurrence, the City of San Jose's Emergency Plan provides detailed instructions and procedures regarding the responsibilities of City personnel and coordination with other agencies to ensure safety for the resident's of San Jose. Disaster preparedness planning should be continued in San Jose and the City should promote awareness and caution regarding possible natural hazards to the general public. The City should also continue updating the San Jose Building Code and Fire Prevention Code to address geologic, fire and other hazards.

Soils and Geologic Conditions

A goal listed in San Jose's General Plan is to protect the community from soil erosion, soil contamination, weak and expansive soils, and geologic instability. In an effort to achieve this goal, the City should require a soil and geologic review of properties that are under proposal for development. The land should be assessed for potential seismic hazards, surface ruptures, liquefaction, landslides, mudsliding, erosion, and sedimentation in order to determine if these hazards can be adequately mitigated. Residential development that is proposed to be built on property formerly used for agricultural or heavy industrial uses should incorporate adequate mitigation/remediation for contaminated soils, as recommended through the Development Review process.

Earthquakes

In order to minimize the risk from exposure to seismic activity, San Jose should require that all new buildings be designed and constructed to resist stresses produced by earthquakes and that structures that already exist and that are susceptible to collapsing or failing in an earthquake should be rehabilitated or eliminated. New development should only be approved in areas where seismic hazards can be properly mitigated. A geotechnical study should be performed on proposed development locations. Additionally, public utilities and facilities should only be placed in areas where liquefaction mitigation measures can be incorporated into the project. Land uses in close proximity to water retention levees or dams should be restricted unless such facilities have been determined to incorporate adequate seismic stability.

Flood

The City maintains that new development should be designed to provide protection from potential impacts of flooding during the 100 year flood and that development in watershed areas should only be allowed when adequate mitigation measures are incorporated into project designs. New urban development should be required to provide adequate flood control retention facilities and additional facilities should be developed in areas where existing facilities are nearing capacity. Areas that are designated floodways should be preserved for non-urban uses. The City and the Santa Clara Valley Water District should specifically develop flood control facilities to protect the Alviso and North San Jose areas from the occurrence of a 100 year flood. The City also believes that emergency evacuation plans for residents living in areas that are subject to possible dam failure inundation and flooding should be prepared and updated periodically. Additionally, storm drainage projects should be designed to minimize potential damage due to storm waters and flooding.

Fire

To reduce fire hazard potential in the hills and wilderness areas, San Jose conducts "controlled burning" programs and maintenance programs and promotes agricultural uses such as grazing

and special planting. All new development should be constructed to the fire safety standards listed in the San Jose Building Code. Development adjacent to heavily grassed and/or hillsides should be designed and located to minimize fire hazards to life and property, including the use of preventative site design, landscaping, and sprinklers. Any new development should also provide adequate access for emergency vehicles as well as for evacuation routes. As part of the development review process, anticipated fire response times and fire flows should be taken into consideration.

Hazardous Materials

San Jose should require proper storage and disposal of hazardous materials to prevent leakage, potential explosions, fires, and the escape of harmful gases. An analysis of soils and groundwater should be done as part of the environmental review process including in a new development proposal. When contamination is present during this analysis, the City should report this information to the appropriate agencies that regulate the cleanup of toxic contamination.

Land Use Element

One of San Jose's Residential Land Use goals is to protect humans and property from hazards. In an effort to support this goal, several policies exist. The City proclaims that residential development should be allowed in areas with identified hazards to human habitation only if these hazards are adequately mitigated. San Jose has a Greenline/Urban Growth Boundary policy that is designed to protect public health and safety by preventing urban development in areas subject to natural hazards.

Urban development in hillside areas, subject to potential seismic, landslide, fire, and other environmental hazards which can create risks to public safety, is limited by San Jose's General Plan. The hillside development policies found in this plan guide the development of hillside areas with slopes of 7% or greater and, to the extent that such development is permitted, to minimize the exposure of people and property to environmental hazards and to ensure that potential damage to the hillsides is reduced. Clustering of residential development in hillside areas should be encouraged and densities of one dwelling unit per acre or greater should be located only where adequate services and facilities can be feasibly provided and damage to such services and facilities can be avoided. No new construction should occur on ridgelines or on slopes exceeding 30% that are a part of the major hillside areas or ridges that surround the valley floor. The City encourages the preservation of hillside vegetation and, if vegetation must be removed, it should require appropriate replanting projects.

The City also believes that design solutions should be considered in the development review process, which addresses security, aesthetics and public safety. Public safety issues include minimum clearances around buildings, fire protection measures such as peak load water requirements, construction techniques, and minimum road widths and other standards set forth in relevant City Codes. All development projects should comply with the safety standards established in these referenced codes. In hillside areas, the City should require soils and geologic review of hillside

development proposals to assess potential hazards such as seismic, surface ruptures, liquefaction, landsliding, mudsliding, erosion and sedimentation in order to determine if these hazards are present and can be adequately mitigated. Geotechnical studies for hillside development proposals should determine the actual extent of seismic and other hazards, optimum location for structures, the advisability of special structural requirements, and the feasibility and desirability of a proposed facility in a specified location.

San Jose should require the undergrounding of distribution utility lines serving new development sites as well as proposed redevelopment sites. The City should also encourage programs for underground installation of existing overhead distribution lines.

Housing Element

San Jose's goal is to provide adequate and affordable housing to its entire population. Housing should comply with the provisions of the Building and Housing Codes and should be situated in an environment which does not endanger the health, safety, or well-being of occupants. The City of San Jose uses the California Building Code (CBC) as the standard for all new construction. The City also adopted local amendments regarding certain structural design requirements, compliance with FEMA regulations, fire sprinkler regulations, and other building and plumbing requirements. Such amendments specifically address special climatic, geological, and topographical conditions unique to the San Francisco Bay Area region that can affect the health, welfare, and safety of local residents. New development is also subject to a design review, to ensure that building materials and architectural techniques meet the Codes. New housing development is restricted by the Urban Growth Boundary, which generally follows the 15% slope line of the hillsides surrounding San Jose, and excludes land that are subject to geologic or seismic hazards that are deemed inappropriate for urban development.

Floodplain Management Ordinance/Plan

In an effort to reduce the risk of loss of life, health, and property due to periodic flood inundation, the City of San Jose has adopted a Special Flood Hazard Area Regulations Ordinance amending Chapter 17.08 of title 17 of the San Jose Municipal Code. The purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare, and to minimize public and private losses due to flood conditions in specific areas by legally enforceable regulations applied uniformly throughout the community to all publicly and privately owned land within flood prone areas. The Deputy Director of Public Works or their designee is appointed to administer, implement and enforce the Ordinance.

The Ordinance includes regulations to restrict or prohibit uses which are dangerous to health, safety, and property due to water or erosion hazards, or which result in damaging increases in erosion or flood heights or velocities; require that uses vulnerable to floods, including facilities which serve such uses, be protected against flood damage at the time of initial construction; control the alteration of natural floodplains, stream channels, and natural protective barriers, which help accommodate or channel floodwaters; control filling, grading, dredging, and other development which may increase flood damage; and prevent or regulate the construction of flood barriers which will unnaturally divert floodwaters or which may increase flood hazards in other areas.

Capital Improvements Plan

In their December 2008 CIP Status Report, the City of San Jose lists numerous projects that could potentially aid in hazard mitigation. To enhance pedestrian and vehicle safety, many street improvement projects, including the construction of sidewalks, upgrading and adding street lighting, reconfiguring curbs and gutters, installing bike lanes and pedestrian walkways, and general paved roadway maintenance, are funded and ongoing throughout the City. Transportation funds have also been allocated to help improve safety and security at the Norman Y. Mineta San Jose International Airport to help prevent an aviation or terrorist incident from occurring. A seismic retrofitting of the Southwest Expressway was also scheduled to occur in San Jose, which would make the expressway better designed in the event of an earthquake.

Sanitary sewer and water system construction, upgrade, and maintenance projects are also being funded and taking place throughout the City. These projects help to ensure that utility infrastructure will continue to be able to support the population of San Jose and to provide residents with clean water and an adequate sanitary system. To reduce the potential for flooding in San Jose, efforts are underway to develop a comprehensive Water Pollution Control Plant Master Plan that would monitor aging infrastructure, population growth, flood control and land uses. Storm drain construction and maintenance projects are also designed to control flooding within San Jose.

In San Jose, funds are also allocated toward public safety projects that may be beneficial to prepare for an emergency event. An Emergency Communications Dispatch Center is scheduled to be built. Emergency response data analysis and mapping is also ongoing in San Jose to better prepare the City for a disaster. New fire and police stations and training facilities are funded by the CIP to better prepare and equip first responders. Replacement and renovation to the City's underground fuel tank is also funded in order to ensure an emergency fuel supply is available.

San Jose's Capital Improvement Program funds an underground utility program that controls the undergrounding of overhead utilities to prevent damage from downed power lines. Tree trimming is another preventative measure taken by the City to minimize the amount of debris that can result from a strong storm. Weed abatement is also conducted to inhibit wildfires.

The City of San Jose identified several ordinances and policies currently utilized for hazard mitigation in the matrix of regional mitigation strategies prepared by ABAG as part of the 2010 plan update. Below is a summary of these key ordinances and policies.

19.3.3 National Flood Insurance Program

For decades, the national response to flood disasters was simply to provide disaster relief to flood victims. Funded by citizen tax dollars, this approach failed to reduce losses and didn't provide a way to cover the damage costs of all flood victims. To compound the problem, the public generally couldn't buy flood coverage from insurance companies, because private insurance companies consider floods too costly to insure. In the face of mounting flood losses and escalating costs of disaster relief to U.S. taxpayers, Congress established the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The goals of the program are to reduce future flood damage through floodplain management, and to provide people with flood insurance. Community participation in the NFIP is voluntary.

The City of San Jose has participated in the National Flood Insurance Program since 1975. All residents of the City are eligible to purchase federal flood insurance. The City continues to maintain full compliance with the NFIP.

19.3.3.1 Community Rating System (CRS)

The CRS is a voluntary part of the National Flood Insurance Program that seeks to coordinate all flood-related activities, reduce flood losses, facilitate accurate insurance rating, and promote public awareness of flood insurance by creating incentives for a community to go beyond minimum floodplain management requirements. The incentives are in the form of insurance premium discounts. CRS ratings are on a 10-point scale (from 10 to 1, with 1 being the best rating), with residents of the community who live within FEMA's Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) receiving a 5% reduction in flood insurance rates for every Class improvement in the community's CRS rating.

The City of San Jose joined the Community Rating System in October 1991 and has a current class rating of 7. Properties within FEMA's Special Flood Hazard Areas in San Jose receive a 15% reduction in flood insurance rates. Properties within San Jose and outside the SFHA receive a 5% discount in flood insurance rates.

19.3.3.2 Repetitive Loss Properties

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) insures properties against flooding losses in the Bay Area through the [National Flood Insurance Program](#). As part of the process to reduce or eliminate repetitive flooding to structures across the United States, FEMA has developed an

official Repetitive Loss Strategy. The purpose behind the national strategy is to identify, catalog, and propose mitigation measures to reduce flood losses to the relatively few number of structures that absorb the majority of the premium dollars from the national flood insurance fund.

A *repetitive loss property* is defined by FEMA as “a property for which two or more National Flood Insurance Program losses of at least \$1,000 each have been paid within any 10-year period since 1978.”

The City of San Jose has seven repetitive flood loss properties. Due to the percentage of damages in relation to the structural value, three of these properties have been required to elevate the structure in order to avoid future losses. The following is a table summarizing repetitive losses in the City.

19.4.2 Exposure Analysis

Exposure analyses are used to quantify assets which are “exposed” to risk. This is the first step towards understanding the complete value of assets at risk to identified hazards. This section includes an exposure analysis (discussion of assets at risk) for the profiled hazards in Section 4.

Overlay analyses (using GIS) were conducted for the mappable hazards such as wildfire, flood, and the earthquake related hazards. These analyses compare the location of the critical facilities with the mapped hazard area (i.e. floodplains, wildfire threat zones, shaking potential areas, etc.) and result in a listing of which facilities are at most risk to which hazard. Not all hazards are mappable and some hazards, such as drought, are equally likely throughout the entire County. For these hazards, a general exposure summary is presented in Section 19.4.2.1.

19.4.2.1 General Exposure

ABAG’s website (<http://quake.abag.ca.gov/mitigation/landuse/>) presents the results of the regional exposure analysis through a searchable online database. Users can view the summaries of land use and infrastructure exposed to the mappable hazards. This section presents the general summary of land use and infrastructure in the City of San Jose. These should be considered at risk to the hazards of equal likelihood throughout the entire County geography (i.e. drought, extreme heat, thunderstorm, etc).



Inventory of Soft-First Story Multi-Family Dwellings City of San Jose





Figure 19-1: Inventory of Soft-First Story Multi-Family Dwellings-City of San Jose









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19.6 PLAN MAINTENANCE

19.6.1 Monitoring, evaluating, updating the plan

The City of San Jose Office of Emergency Services will be responsible for ensuring that this annex is monitored on an on-going basis. However, the major disasters affecting San Jose’s community, legal changes, notices from ABAG (as the lead agency in this process), notices from Santa Clara County (lead agency for the County-wide Annex), and other triggers will be used as well. Finally, the Annex will be a discussion/work item on the City’s Citizen Corps Council agenda each year, and department heads and other emergency preparedness staff, who serve in the City’s Emergency Operations Center, will focus on evaluating the Annex in light of technological and political changes that may occur during the year or other significant events. This group, in collaboration with Santa Clara County, will be responsible for determining if the plan should be updated.

The City of San Jose is committed to reviewing and updating this plan annex at least once every five years, as required by the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000. The City’s Director of Emergency Services will contact ABAG four years after this plan is approved to ensure that ABAG plans to undertake the plan update process. If so, the City plans to participate in the multi-jurisdictional plan. If ABAG is unwilling or unable to act as the lead agency in the multi-jurisdictional effort, other agencies will be contacted, including the Santa Clara County Office of Emergency Services. The jurisdictions within Santa Clara County should continue to work together on updating this multi-jurisdictional plan.

The public will continue to be involved whenever the plan is updated and as appropriate during the monitoring and evaluation process. Prior to adoption of updates, the City will provide the opportunity for the public to comment on the updates. A public notice will be published prior to the meeting to announce the comment period and meeting logistics. Moreover, the City will engage stakeholders in community emergency planning.

Due to the upcoming Thanksgiving Holiday, the November 26 edition of the CMO Weekly will be cancelled. The CMO Weekly will resume on December 3, 2010.

Airport Passenger Traffic Increases Again in October—For the second consecutive month, passenger activity at SJC has slightly increased compared to the same period a year ago. October 2010 traffic gained 0.3% compared to October 2009, following an increase of 0.2% in September. Although the rate of increase is small, it may represent the bottoming out of a three-year period of monthly declines since mid-2007. However, the number of commercial passenger operations fell by 11% compared to a year ago, which means that SJC flights continue to fly with even fuller loads. Southwest Airlines will be adding six daily flights at SJC over the next six months, and Alaska Airlines' new flights to Mexico (Guadalajara and Cabo San Lucas) begin in December and to Kauai in March. PRNS Awarded Grants for Park Construction & Expansion—The Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Department (PRNS) was awarded two major grants by California State Parks to build one new park and expand an existing park in San José. The department received \$400,000 toward building Nisich Park, a new construction in the Tully/Hwy 101 area and \$600,000 to expand Buena Vista Park in the Burbank neighborhood. The grants were awarded through Proposition 84 funding. Prop 84 is a competitive grant program focused on the creation of new parks and new recreation opportunities in critically underserved communities across California. PRNS to Host Second Bay Area Revenue Management School—On December 3, the Parks, Recreation & Neighborhood Services Department (PRNS) will offer the second annual Bay Area Revenue Management School (BARMS) for Parks and Recreation professionals throughout the region. Nationally-recognized experts in the Parks and Recreation field will offer instruction on two tracks: Policy & Strategic Planning and Business Plan Development. The sessions will be held on December 3 at Seven Trees Community Center, Friday, December 10, at the Dolce Hayes Mansion and Friday, January 13, again at Seven Trees. The school was formed to equip Bay Area Parks and Recreation staff with essential tools necessary to create and maintain financially-sustainable Parks and Recreation programs and operations. Environmental Services Offers First Ever Grease Hauler Workshop in South Bay—On November 10, twenty-seven representatives from 16 different grease hauling companies participated in a Grease Hauler Workshop. This is the first workshop of its kind in the South Bay.

The Workshop was focused on educating and guiding local grease haulers on Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG) as well as on stormwater requirements, and Best Management Practices (BMPs). Guidance on grease control device maintenance and documentation procedures were also provided to attendees. The workshop was designed to reach out and enlist the support of grease hauling companies to prevent grease blockages and overflows in the sanitary sewer system. Updating County-wide Local Hazard Mitigation Plan—The San Jose Office of Emergency Services is working with the County of Santa Clara to update the countywide local hazard mitigation plan. This plan will identify projects throughout the County that would help prevent or reduce the damage caused by natural disasters such as flooding or earthquakes. The plan is updated every five years. In order to ensure that the plan evaluates all of the city's needs, San Jose residents are encouraged to provide their input and feedback by taking part in an online survey. Emotional Intelligence Presentation—On November 17, the Human Resources Department hosted a keynote address on Emotional Intelligence that was attended by over 300 employees. Noted authors Dr. Fred Luskin, the Director of the Stanford Forgiveness Project, and Mr. Mike Robbins presented inspiring and practical ways for coping with conflict or stressful situations. The presentation also served to kick off a new Citywide program created by and for employees called Collaborative Resolution. Two employees experiencing an interpersonal conflict may voluntarily request the assistance of trained conflict facilitators to guide them through a process that leads to mutually agreed-upon solutions. The volunteer facilitators are employees from various departments who are certified conflict mediators and have completed at least 40 hours of training. Research has shown that this method is up to 85-90% effective in resolving conflicts and the handful of conflicts already mediated through the City's program have a 100% success rate.
